Team 4 - One bell was consistently too quick but there was a good general rhythm.
Team 5 - Pretty good but one bell too quick at the lead.

Also, one of the ringers had brought along his younger son for his first lesson. The tower keeper returned to the snug of the ale-house, agitated at the way that the evening had ended. If his brother had not been at home to take the crucial telephone call then he could have opened up the tower on Sunday morning to face two white-haired corpses with accusing looks fixed, masklike, on their waxen faces and in their sightless eyes.

He shuddered at the thought. Perhaps he should have an extra pint to soothe his jangled nerves?

# RICHARD BING 1946-2005 

Richard was a product of the post-war baby boom, born in London, $5^{\text {th }}$ April 1946. He came from well-to-do stock and was able to trace his family back to the time of William the Conqueror. His father was elected as the Labour MP for Hornchurch in the Labour landslide victory of 1946. The family lived in Clapham Common where Richard started his schooling and started singing in the choir at the local church. He went for auditions at several cathedrals before gaining a place in the choir at Southwark Cathedral, and attended St Olave's and St. Saviour's school, Tooley Street. He also studied the piano and flute and was a proficient performer.

After his voice broke, Richard went to a boarding school in Birmingham for a while and after his A levels continued his studies at Walthamstow Poly. Whilst he was there he took up ringing at St. Mary's in October 1964. From here he went to Oxford Poly to study geology - he met up with Roy Jones and they did a lot of ringing together. Richard decided that the academic life was not to his liking and started work with Blue Circle Cement where he was able to put his geology skills to good use. He did plenty of ringing in Kent and the London area at this time and did a lot of travelling by bicycle following his ancient OS maps. Richard kept these maps for many years and would update them in his own hand by pencilling in added roads and other features.

Richard returned to London where he had digs in Tooting and joined the ringers of the London County Association and especially at St. Mary's, Lambeth where David Town was the Tower Captain (a friendship that was to last). On practice night, Valentine's Day, 1972 a young student, Hazel Topping, went to ring at Lambeth. Richard was immediately smitten and after the visit to the local hostelry offered to drive her home - even though she had to help push the car for part of the way!! At the end of the evening, Richard told Hazel that you've got to go to Clerkenwell - they're the sweetest ring of eight in London. Richard and Hazel's relationship blossomed and they went to five practices every week: Clerkenwell, Lambeth, Chelsea, Tooting and Kensington and also attended many LCA events.

At one time, Richard was Junior Steward of the LCA and took part in the monthly quarter peals with Monty Meyer (keep 'em moving) at Fulham. Hazel and Richard also went


In 1973, at Bill Theobald's suggestion, Richard was able to take up a vacancy at the Whitechapel Bellfoundry and due to his musical abilities Richard took on the running of the handbell section. In order to understand more about handbell ringing Richard joined the Whittington Ringers and rang with them for many years.

Richard and Hazel were married on $22^{\text {nd }}$ June 1974 at St. Philip's, Cheam (no bells) but John Lott and three LCA ladies duly obliged by ringing handbells after the ceremony. The Bings then moved to Abbey Wood, South East London and joined the congregation at St. Michael and All Angels Church (no bells). The nearest tower was Woolwich and Richard and Hazel joined the band. Richard soon became the Tower Captain/Secretary in 1975, a position which he held for about twenty years. In 1976, Rev. John Ardley became Vicar at Abbey Wood - John had been curate at St. John's Caterham, where the bells of St. Mary's, Lambeth were now installed. Richard encouraged John to continue his ringing with the Woolwich band. At Abbey Wood, Richard, John and Rev. Mike Harding, the Curate, were instrumental in establishing the bar in St. Michael's Hall - Richard was the chairman for many years and supported it in many ways!!

As well as the usual ringing at Woolwich, Richard organised many outings, many of which involved the choir and congregation of Abbey Wood and we would sing Evensong as part of the outing as well. I became Director of Music at Abbey Wood in 1981 and at the time was taking a break from ringing. One evening in the church bar Richard announced that there was a surplus of Barley Wine bottles which needed to be sold off at a cheap rate when I announced that It's a shame Olive's not here to help out my secret was out of the bag (Richard being perceptive as ever) and I was soon encouraged back to ringing again! [The Olive was, of course, Oliver Rogers, whose favourite drink was barley wine. I had rung at All Hallows, Twickenham whilst at college in Isleworth; Olive and Harold had helped out with the ringing there for a while].

Eventually at Abbey Wood we had a ringing band of nine ringers - not bad for a church with only one bell (but the
church bar and Richard's encouragement helped!) and in 1983 we rang a $75^{\text {th }}$ anniversary of the church quarter peal at St. John's, Erith. Richard then turned his hand to organising several ringers' holiday weeks and we had some wonderful times together. On one of these holidays whilst visiting a tower somewhere near the Welsh border, Richard remarked that one of the local ringers had the sort of teeth you could suck tomatoes through a tennis racquet. This was typical of Richard's quick wit, turn of phrase, sense of humour and fun!

In 1988, Richard decided that he needed a change from working at The Whitechapel Foundry and he did consider starting his own handbell business. However, he thought it best to look at other options and was successful in being accepted for the Civil Service and worked for some years in the Property Services Agency. When this post became redundant he went to work for the Woolwich Building Society and then for Glaxo Wellcome. This job also came to an end but Hazel was working at Charlton Park Special School and at the time the school needed someone to help in the administration department for a short while. Richard took up the challenge and his skills proved to be so invaluable that he was made a permanent and highly valued member of staff.

In latter years, after giving up as Tower Captain at Woolwich, Richard decided to take up his choral skills again at Abbey Wood (I had moved on as Director of Music by then - I wished he had joined the choir during my time.) However, he still continued to ring with us at
 times especially for weddings, special events and quarter peals. Richard was often to be found in Rose's pub, Woolwich and was a connoisseur of real ale. He was always prepared to talk to others in the pub, regardless of who they were. He brewed his own beer, of good quality which went down well at parties in the Bing household. Richard enjoyed walking in the countryside - with his old OS maps and regularly took part in the church walking holidays. He also had his own allotment and grew some wonderful vegetables, although Hazel always felt that he could have grown more if he didn't chat so much to others when he was there!


Richard was a true gentleman and never had a bad word to say about anyone but, at the same time, he did not suffer fools gladly and on many occasions would make himself known, especially when things like public transport did not run to plan! Whilst talking about transport, Richard was a cautious driver but a very difficult passenger!

2004 was a special year as Richard and Hazel celebrated their $30^{\text {th }}$ wedding anniversary by going to Toronto for the World Symposium for Handbell Ringers - they had a great time although Richard had started suffering from a sore shoulder. In October 2004 Richard organised the Bing Ring which was to celebrate his 40 years of ringing. Unfortunately, Richard's ringing was hampered by his shoulder condition but he was very pleased with the quarters and other ringing which took place. Soon after this it was discovered that Richard was suffering from a virulent form of cancer and there was little hope of him making a recovery. Richard fought bravely with a great sense of humour and faith. Shortly before he died, he said to the Curate at Abbey Wood: You know, I feel very sorry for those who die without faith. In his last days Richard was strengthened by his faith and he devised his own Requiem Mass and chose all the music. Richard died early on $4^{\text {th }}$ February in the company of Hazel and their sons, Daniel and Edmund. There was a full church of family and friends for Richard's Requiem Mass and ringing took place at Woolwich afterwards.

Richard was a true gentleman, a great friend and fun to be with - we will all miss him very much.
