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## WWII Remembered 10th July

This date is to be the day of commemoration of the 60th anniversary of the ending of World War II in Europe. Ringers have been asked by the Ministry of Defence to mark the occasion by ringing at 5 o'clock on that Sunday. The President of the Central Council, writing in The Ringing World of $18^{\text {th }}$ February 2005, said:
"Bellringers will be pleased to receive notification of the commemoration event planned for $10^{\text {th }}$ July. . . . Though we all understand the importance of such a commemoration, there are also many who remember the events of 60 years ago and for whom this commemorative ringing will hold a much deeper significance."
"The Central Council wishes to encourage bands throughout the country to ring at 5pm on Sunday $10^{\text {th }}$ July as requested by the WWII 60th Anniversary Commemoration Team Chief of Staff."
"Given that the ringing is to take place on a Sunday, it would be nice if ringers would endeavour to make sure that the general public understand the significance of this particular ringing through parish magazines, newsletters and local media."

To this end the PR Committee of the Central Council has designed a suitable poster to be fixed on church notice boards, tower doors, or wherever, to indicate to the public at large why the bells are ringing.

## The Boomer

No visit to Vienna is complete without going to the $\mathrm{S} \dagger$ Stephen's Cathedral (Stephansdom) which was built in the 1300's on the site of an earlier basilica which had been destroyed by fire. The cathedral has one of the biggest bells in the world known as the Pummerin or "Boomer".

This was originally cast in 1711 from the cannon used by the Turks during the siege of Vienna in 1683 and

weighed in at $22,511 \mathrm{~kg}$. Unfortunately it was damaged beyond repair, along with extensive damage to the cathedral itself, by a fire resulting from allied bombing near the end of World War II. It was recast in 1951 and now weighs $21,383 \mathrm{~kg}$ or almost exactly 21 tons with a diameter of 3.6 m ( 12 feet); it sounds the note C2. It was re-hung in 1957 and is rung at midnight on New Year's Eve to welcome the New Year. It is also rung on other occasions such as the death of
the Pope and again at his funeral. A trip in the tiny lift up the North Tower to see the bell is well worth the $€ 3.50$ as it also gives good views of the cathedral roof with its 500,000 glazed tiles and of the city itself.

Koln Cathedral has a bigger bell and the biggest in the world is the Tsar bell in Moscow which weighs in at 198 tons. After it was cast in 1733 it was badly damaged when an 11 ton piece broke off. It has never been rung and is on display in the Kremlin in Moscow.

Saturday $21^{\text {st }}$ May saw a dozen or so members and friends of the band set off on the annual West Wickham Ringing Outing, which this year centred around Canterbury.

We began at S $\dagger$ Stephen's in Canterbury, a very nice ring of eight, and despite most of the band being used to only six bells, we rang a very respectable course of Plain Bob Major and then Grandsire Triples. The next tower was St Nicholas, Sturry; again a very nice ring and plain courses of Cambridge and Norwich were achieved on these light bells. Sturry bells had a reputation some years ago of being somewhat wayward to ring well, but extensive work a while ago now has corrected that and they go very well indeed.

We then moved to St Vincent in Littlebourne. The church is being re-plastered and extensively redecorated internally so after negotiating the scaffolding, dustsheets and tools, we were met by this slightly challenging ring of six. Although they only weighed 10 cwt , they needed a good pull to keep the ringing flowing. We stopped for a good homemade lunch in the village at the King William, where the landlord only took over recently and is evidently a keen cricket fan.

Our next stop was St Mary's Chartham, where antirrhinums provided colour to the top of the tower. These bells were a lovely ring of six, although rather heavier than those we'd experienced in
 the morning, in an idyllic setting. Again, alongside more traditional methods, we tried our hand at Cambridge, Norwich, and a course of Stedman.

The next tower, St Michael's, Throwley was unfortunately off my Ordnance Survey map, so with Alys as leader, six cars set off on a rally through narrow Kentish lanes, negotiating some with thick grass down the middle. We had to avoid mothers and children in pushchairs on quiet afternoon strolls and cyclists, until we finally arrived at the church which luckily had been left open for us. The tower inside can only be described as sparse, but the bells went well, despite being the heaviest of the day and we ended
with a course of Little Bob Major.

It was a successful day, with a good pick of towers and on occasions some very good striking, which we are not renowned for. It was also great to get all our ringers, both old and new together. Thanks go to Nick Wilkins for his support - his expertise allowed us to expand our repertoire on the day.

In order to retain the status of being "recognised by the Central Council" a Ringing Centre is required to submit an annual report of its activities. 2004 was quite an active year for Dover and we hadn't realised just how active it was until the time came to compile the report. On the report form is a tick-box to apply for the Worshipful Company of Founders' annual prize, awarded to the Centre that is deemed to have made the greatest contribution to ringing.

To our amazement our speculative little tick in the box has brought fame, recognition, and most importantly - money! Representatives from the Worshipful Company will be coming to see the Centre later this year for a formal presentation of the cheque. In the mean time we shall be planning some form of ceremony, and deciding how best to use the $£ 500$ to further good practice in teaching ringing.

What did we do to impress the judges so much? Here are some extracts from our report that may give some idea of our activities.

Achievements during 2004 including type and
frequency of courses:
Weekly "clinics" in basic skills started in January 2004 and continued throughout the year. Only five Saturday mornings were missed for church festivals and other events. The band at St Peter-in-Thanet has now moved on to standard methods after coming regularly to the early clinics.

We ran three pre-booked courses, in Kaleidoscope Ringing, Stedman, and Surprise respectively. The latter was held at Lyminge, the first use of a tower away from our base at Dover. A trial run of a "teaching the teachers" project has helped to establish a new band at Walmer.

Comparatively new ideas such as Kaleidoscope and other novel teaching strategies, using Bastow and Cloisters for example, are filtering through to other towers.

In collaboration with the Kent County Association, the Centre ran a public relations exercise during the weekend of the annual Dover Regatta. Of the estimated twenty thousand people at the Regatta, over five hundred visited the mobile belfry.

How did we measure our success?
45 students representing 16 towers from four of the six districts in the County have attended Saturday morning sessions. The 20 tutors and helpers came from 9 different towers, although it is difficult to draw a distinction as students from earlier sessions may return as helpers.

Favourable feedback from client towers gives an informal assessment of the extent to which fresh ideas are being adopted. The Centre continues to monitor the situation at Walmer and provides assistance there when required.

The Saturday morning beginners' "clinics" have run for 18 months now and are now wearing rather thin; some new initiatives are needed urgently to regain their earlier popularity. Someone did whisper "Stedman" and "Cloisters", but don't be put off by that. We don't want to frighten away beginners, who are our prime clients, so we'll explore those possibilities very gently. Please make more use of the practice opportunities at Dover each Saturday morning. Come to learn or to help, but do come - use it, or lose it!

The aim is to sustain public interest by varying things from year from year. Let's hope that our efforts in the town will encourage the organisers to have us back at the Regatta site next year.

As the Regatta is replacing the Canterbury District's August meeting, we are offering general ringing on the Saturday at the usual meeting time from 3 to $4: 30$. Tea can be taken on the seafront; either bring your own picnic or patronise the multiplicity of refreshment stalls! ## Insurance

Problems are still being experienced obtaining cover for major bell restoration works. Applications have been made to a variety of Brokers, contact has been made with contractors, voluntary organisation's, bell founders and other associations. It was agreed that the subject should be raised at the Central Council Meeting due to be held shortly since this problem will
affect all associations where major bell restoration works take place. The difficulty in obtaining insurance seems to centre around risk assessment where work is undertaken above 3 meters above ground level, it was reported that Whitechapel Bell Foundry was struggling with this issue, their insurance had risen 300\%.

KCACR still have in place a policy which covers members for minor maintenance work and bell ringing. Minor maintenance work is classified as such things as stay, rope replacement, if a faculty is required for anything it becomes major work and therefore outside the current policy limit.

The Bell Restoration Committee have suspended all major works and are advising Churches that if they can obtain insurance the work will be undertaken at their tower.
