## KCACR wins Tewkesbury Shield

After three consecutive victories in the Essex Trophy, we wondered what the Kent band could try next? Then, someone had the idea that they might like to have a go at the Tewkesbury Shield.
The Tewkesbury Shield is, by my reckoning, the longest running National striking competition. It started in 1973, two years before the first National 12-bell Striking Contest, and developed from a local 8-bell competition, to a National 10-bell competition. Curiously, it has never become a 12-bell competition, even though there is a fine ring of twelve at Tewkesbury Abbey, cast by John Taylor in 1962.
Nine teams managed to arrive on the day, and St Martin's Guild were drawn to ring first. The churchyard was haunted by many sombre faces, as the band from Birmingham meted out the standard for the day. Fortunately, we didn't have to wait too long before it was our turn to ring.
This was our first opportunity to ring together as a complete band, though everyone had at least practised the test piece, a touch of Stedman Caters, either at Leeds, or St Magnus, the previous weekends, thanks to Diane Reynolds, Jeremy Byers, Rona Joiner and Ben Kipling for helping out.


After a few minutes practice and a few more minutes of intense concentration, made easier by the metronomic beat being set by the tenor ringer, it was soon over and we proceeded to take up our listening positions, at the Royal Hop Pole Hotel.

From the beer garden, the sound of the bells wafted gently across from the Abbey. Some teams sounded better

| 9th | Oxford DG | $55 \%$ | than others, but we had no idea how our performance compared with the rest. Our only clue came when a stranger approached us and asked if we were the Kent team. Once we'd admitted that we were, he then declared that his mate reckoned we'd won it. Was he pulling our leg?

Shortly after the last team had rung, the judges were ready to announce the results. We were said to have rung with great style and great panache. We were placed first, with a score of $85 \%$, ahead of St Martin's Guild in second place, with a score of $78 \%$. What a result!

So the KCACR won the Tewkesbury Shield at first time of entering, with a 70\% Lewisham District band.

Second Lieutenant Bryan Osmond Dewes was a ringer at Lee and a member of the Kent County Association who died on the 30th July 1915, this is some further information about him:

Died 30/07/1915 Age 21 Middlesex Regiment 1st
Bn. Commemorated at Rue-Du-Bacquerot (13th London) Graveyard, Laventie, France Grave F. 19. Son of Hugh William and Alice Jane Dewes, of The Grey House, Shiplake, Oxon. Born: Beckenham, Kent Enlisted: Unknown Resided: Harley Street, Middlesex

Further information:
He was educated at St. Andrews and at Repton and was about to enter St. Thomas's Hospital as a medical student having obtained the first place in the competition for an Arts Scholarship. He was a member of the London Rowing Club, which he represented at Henley in 1914. He enlisted in the 28th County of London Battalion (Artist's Rifles), Service Number 1440, in August 1914. He was commissioned as a Second Lieutenant on Feb. 2nd, 1915 and was serving as machine gun officer when he was killed. He is remembered on War Memorials, at St Margaret's Church in Lee, at Shiplake, Repton School and St Thomas's Hospital

I try and contact all towers that had ringers who died during the Great War, with the 100th anniversary of his death fast approaching, I wondered if somebody might want to consider arranging some commemorative ringing? I am aware there are no longer and change ringing bells at Lee.

I am looking to try and see if we can do this for ALL ringers that died and are commemorated in the Rolls of Honour.

His name will appear in the Roll of Honour for ringers in a future edition of the Ringing World.

## Meridian Ringers Outing

A number of local residents have come and said how much they appreciate the bells and the church. We are becoming adept at putting up the monitors, tables and information banners! Natalie has been baking bell-decorated cakes for sale and the Friends of Christchurch have supplied refreshments.

All the pupils from Christchurch Primary school visited the church at the beginning of June. Following the service we had an 'Open Tower' morning for which a large number of the congregation stayed on. Mark gave presentations on the clock and on ringing to two large groups. Others watched on the monitors in the porch. Andy Smith took a group photo of past and present band members before we all went to the hall for the Community lunch. This was organised by the Erith churches and was a splendid spread - many thanks to them.

# oughborough Carillon 

Having recently returned to ringing after a break of eight years and with my youngest daughter about to complete her first year at Loughborough University, I felt compelled on my latest visit to check out the Loughborough Carillon. To be fair, I had tried on two previous occasions and always found it closed, but this was Father's Day and we were in luck as we found ourselves in Queens Park at the right time.

The tower itself is a war memorial completed in 1923 to remember those who lost their lives in the 1914-1918 war. It stands 152 ft high, is grade II listed and is unique in Britain, being the only purpose built carillon tower.

Like most towers, access is via a narrow stone spiral staircase with 138 steps that take you to four floors. The first three are devoted to military memorabilia from
each of the armed forces and from both of the World Wars, but although I looked around, my interest was on the fourth level and above.

What I found was something quite unexpected - a carillon that was being played when I had always thought a carillon was a purely mechanical instrument. The carillonist was wearing leather gloves and using her fists to push down heavy wooden levers called batons. Music from the treble clef was played with her hands, whilst pushing down onto pedals with the feet played the lower notes in the bass clef, much like on a church organ.

The levers and pedals are connected to the clappers in the 47 bells hanging in the chamber above by thick wire and what struck me, was the time delay between a note being played and the bell making the sound. As a pianist myself, this seemed very odd.

Being Father's Day, the recital program had been chosen with this in mind and included songs such as 'Bring Me Sunshine', the themes from Dad's Army and Steptoe and Son and 'You'll Never Walk Alone'.

Leaving the carillonist behind and up a short, straight set of stairs brought us to the top of the tower where the bells are hung in a frame surrounded by louvres.

It was quite a sight to see so many bells hanging together, but a little strange for a ringer to hear that familiar sound while looking on and seeing the bells themselves remain motionless.

Unsurprisingly, the bells were all cast at John Taylor Bell Foundry and range in weight from 14Ibs to 82 cwt .

Finally, stepping outside of the chamber housing the bells, we were
able to appreciate the spectacular views over Leicestershire from the balcony on what was a

beautiful sunny afternoon.

Since that trip and in preparation for writing this article, I have remedied my ignorance and discovered that carillon ringing is much more common outside of the UK, particularly in The Netherlands and Belgium, and specifically the Flanders region where the tradition began in 1510. North America also has many towers and carillon ringing can even be studied at such prestigious universities as Berkeley and Princeton, the latter having a ring of 67 bells.

It really was a fascinating visit so if you do find yourselves in the area at any time, then I would highly recommend going to take a look, especially if that coincides with a carillon recital.

The carillon tower is open every afternoon except Mondays, from $1 \mathrm{pm}-4.30 \mathrm{pm}$, between Good Friday and the end of September. Recitals are held every Thursday and Sunday between $1 \mathrm{pm}-2 \mathrm{pm}$, and on the first Thursday of every month in the closed season.

# Rochester District Outing 

"How about an outing to Ipswich on the Rochester District Outing?" asked our friend Helen. "Yes, please!" was our answer.
The outing was all arranged by Doug Davis, Rochester District Secretary. He'd also invited Lewisham District, but only 1 other ringer took him up on the offer, so we met up with Garry Barr in Ipswich as we toured around.
We parked the cars in the car park opposite Ipswich Town FC, then walked to the first tower. (All 6 towers were within walking distance, which was great as we didn't have to get the sat nav out and drive at bottle neck speed to each one), and for once we (Chris and Shelagh) were not the last to arrive at every tower, as is usually the case!) First was St Nicholas, with 5 bells that were a bit rickety, and now in the care of Ipswich Historic Churches Trust who have left it in the same condition as it was after the last Sunday service. We tried a bit of Plain Bob on 5 but the 4 kept coming down. It obviously needed a more experienced ringer than me (Chris), but I did see others struggling with it.
Second tower of the day was St Matthew with 6 bells. Originally built in $15^{\text {th }}$ century and expanded in $19^{\text {th }}$ century to serve as the Garrison Church for the nearby Ipswich Barracks.
Our third tower was St Margaret which had been built by the neighbouring Augustinian Priory in about 1300. With 8 bells we were able to ring some different 8-bell methods.

Then it was time for a most welcome lunch. We'd all brought our own picnic and found a lovely sunny spot in a nearby park to eat it and chat with friends we hadn't seen for a while.

After this welcome rest it was onto tower 4, St Mary le Tower, a treat with 12 bells. We nearly had a lock-out as the key holder had mixed up the times, but Doug managed to rearrange a time with him and we got to ring some rounds and called changes. The bells were mostly not difficult, but as many of you will already know, ringing on 12 bells requires different timing and feels a bit strange at first.

Fifth was St Lawrence with 5 bells, not used as a church anymore but now a café and art gallery. We had time for a coffee before ringing in a tower overlooking the café from the tower window, so the coffee drinkers were treated to a private ringing concert!

Sixth and last tower of the day was St Clement, a very dusty 6 with no electricity. So we were shown up the tower steps by a nice lady with a torch. Daylight luckily came in through a few gaps at the windows and from the tower balcony overlooking the church. It was a little difficult to see what we were ringing, but managed without any mishaps, although a couple of our ringers were already looking forward to their evening meal!

Dinner had been booked at a pub about 20 miles south, and was very welcome and delicious! We had pre-booked and on arrival found reserved tables and good service. So many thanks to Helen for inviting us and Doug for excellent organisation and directions. Lewisham District you missed a treat!
