Chelsfield win County 6 bell

A nice sunny afternoon greeted the 5 teams who assembled at Godmersham in the Canterbury District for the County 6-Bell Striking Competition on Saturday 26th September.
Unfortunately Ashford were unable to field a team this year.

The draw took place at 2.50pm and the first band from the Tonbridge District then headed into the tower to begin the days' proceedings. Brian Law was our able steward for the day, making sure all the bands kept within the rules. All of the teams had completed their test pieces by about 4.30pm and a short while



afterwards the judges, Donald Niblett and Liz Barnes, joined everyone in the church to deliver their verdict.

Donald first thanked everyone for the invitiation for him to come and judge the competition, commenting that it was especially nice to be able to sit in the warm sunshine. He said he had enjoyed the ringing very much, and was pleased to think that this was perhaps an indication of the level of Sunday Service ringing taking place across the County. He also commented that all teams did well, with every band improving in the 2nd half obviously after getting used to the bells as they went along. Liz Barnes then gave the results and comments as follows:

Position	District	Band	Rang	Faults	Judges Comments
1st	Lewisham	Chelsfield	4th	24	Peal Speed: 2h 54m. A very nice piece of ringing, particularly the 2nd half.
2nd	Maidstone	Staplehurst	2nd	40	Peal Speed: 3h 1m. Much slower than the first band. Leading and covering were good, but the middle of the change tended to drag out.
3rd	Canterbury	,	3rd	44	Peal Speed: 2h 55m. Good leading, but the bells in the middle of the change tended to fall in on top of each other with the tenor left dragging behind. A nasty crunch at one point but this didn't phase them and ringing improved afterwards.
4th	Tonbridge	Sevenoaks	1st	52	Peal Speed: 2h 48m Quite fast. Started nervously with inconsistent leading and the tenor dragging behind. Improved in the 2nd part.
5th	Rochester	Bobbing	5th	72	Peal Speed: 3h 6m. The band couldn't seem to agree on a speed. There were rushed leads, and a nasty crunch around in the 3rd lead but they did recover well and improved in the 2nd half.

The judges then presented the trophy to the winning Lewisham District band, and the Chairman Daniel Brady thanked Donald and Liz for judging and presented them with some port and chocolate liqueurs. He then thanked the hosting tower for having us and for the wonderful (and plentiful) tea that had been provided throughout the afternoon.

Rung to commemorate the life of Second Lieutenant Bryan Osmond Dewes, Middlesex Regiment, 1st Bn, a ringer from Lee and member of the Kent County Association, who died in the Great War, on 30th July 1915, aged 21.

Some further information about him:

Died 30/07/1915 Age 21 Middlesex Regiment 1st Bn. Commemorated at Rue-Du-Bacquerot (13th London) Graveyard, Laventie, France Grave F. 19. Son of Hugh William and Alice Jane Dewes, of The Grey House, Shiplake, Oxon. Born: Beckenham, Kent Enlisted: Unknown Resided: Harley Street, Middlesex

Further information:

He was educated at St. Andrews and at Repton and was about to enter St. Thomas's Hospital as a medical student having obtained the first place in the competition for an Arts Scholarship. He was a member of the London Rowing Club, which he represented at Henley in 1914.

He enlisted in the 28th County of London Battalion (Artist's Rifles), Service Number 1440, in August 1914. He was commissioned as a Second Lieutenant on Feb. 2nd, 1915 and was serving as machine gun officer when he was killed. He is remembered on War Memorials, at St Margaret's Church in Lee, at Shiplake, Repton School and St Thomas's Hospital.



Another, happier, event was enjoyed on Saturday 26th September, when we were delighted to celebrate the wedding of two of our ringers, Tiffany Kelly and Tom Baird, both of whom learnt to ring at Eltham. We rang the bells before and after the service, and a number of ringers attended the evening reception. As usual, some of them were among the last to leave!



Since March, we have had a total of nine sessions and attracted about 170 visitors. Visitors' ages ranged from children and young adults to the more mature! Visitors came from all parts of the local community, reflecting the population in the area. We were also visited by about 40 Brownies and over 400 children from Christchurch Primary School. Our hope is that the 'seed' of an interest in bellringing has been planted in at least some of them.

The widespread distribution of our leaflets to all Bexley libraries and a number of

schools and other deanery churches ensured that plenty of people knew about the Open Days. The Christchurch website had much information about the centenary and several visitors found out about it through this medium.

Natalie baked a range of excellent cakes for each open day and the Friends of Christchurch provided tea and coffee. Visitors were very generous and the donations for refreshments have been split between the Friends and our Tower funds.

Rachel now has the task of writing the final report required by the Heritage Lottery Fund!

In other news, we have a new young learner - he attends Christchurch with his family and visited the tower after a Sunday morning service. He is making good progress and will be a helpful addition to the Sunday band as we have temporarily lost our other young ringers. Eloise has returned to Cornwall for her second year at university and Matthew is commencing a degree in Classical Civilisation at Warwick.

WOOLWICH, GREENWICH & DEPTFORD

The Meridian Ringers

Our normal practice night is Wednesday, 8pm-930pm, at Greenwich, but occasionally at St. John's, Deptford or Woolwich if Greenwich is not available. We usually have good attendances at practice nights, sometimes ringing all 10 bells, some triples, minor and some additional doubles methods and some work on Treble Hunting Minor. We are usually doing some service ringing for the monthly Choral Evensong at Greenwich and also ring for Evening Worship at St. John's, Deptford once a month [check the website for dates].

We occasionally also have a monthly practice at Woolwich on a Monday 8-930pm – all welcome; [again, it is best to check our website for the dates].

In the last newsletter, I reported that the ninth clapper at Greenwich came out when we were ringing on Sunday 14th June to celebrate the 800th Anniversary of the Magna Carta. We managed to get the clapper taken down and Alan took it down to the church and showed it to the Vicar and Wardens who immediately said that we'd need to do something about this!

We had already had a quote from Taylors to renovate the clappers last November and we were

due to sort this out this autumn. However, this event set things rolling and the Vicar and Church wardens said that we had to get the work done as soon as possible.

Last autumn, Peter Hayward came down from Taylors to do a survey on the bells as they were due to have some maintenance and he did a full check over and sent us a fully detailed report. This proposed two possible rehanging possibilities - a full rehang and a partial rehang and reconfiguration of the front four bells which would also improve the rope circle. Of more urgency was the need to have all the clappers renovated; Peter also proposed that we have an annual maintenance visit from the foundry. We sent the report to the Vicar and PCC and the plan was to investigate doing something about it in the latter part of 2015 due to various other things happening at the church.

The PCC were in agreement that we should have the annual inspection done from now on. They were happy to have the work done to the clappers but not about the rehanging - mainly due to the age and historical nature of the frame. However, we are hoping to discuss the possibility of the partial rehang of the front 4 in the near future - as this would only affect a slight part of the frame this might be more acceptable to the PCC and other interested parties!

Soon after the mishap with the 9th clapper, we managed to get the 7th, 8th and tenor clappers out but kept the front 6 as we had several weddings to do in July. Then after the last wedding we took out the 6 and then transported them to Loughborough courtesy of Alan Munden and his trailer. Apart from a 2 hour delay at the Dartford crossing we [Alan, Graham, Ken, Jim] had a good trip and were shown round the foundry and had a ring on the bells. All the staff at Taylors were most pleasant and helpful and we intend to return to visit the Foundry in the not too distant future. Transporting the clappers ourselves and taking them out has obviously helped with the costs.

When we were unloading the clappers at Loughborough I asked about the pros/cons of having a wooden clapper for the tenor. [I was recently at Guildford Cathedral for a practice night and David Beadman, their steeple keeper, took us up and showed us the bells - I noticed the wooden clapper and asked him about it; he said it was a real advantage.

So we decided to have a wooden shafted clapper made for the tenor. We can now ring up the tenor easily with one person and the bell also sounds much better.

We have the original tenor clapper, fully restored, on display in the ringing chamber.

A reminder that Freda Cannon, our Tower Captain Emeritus, is now resident at Fairmount Residential Care Home, Mottingham Lane, Mottingham, SE9 4RT, Tel: 020 8857 1064. She would welcome visitors at any reasonable time. Alan picks Freda up to bring her to Greenwich so she can go to Evensong and hear us ringing once a month.

THE BEAUFORT SCALE OF FIRE-UPS

- 0. Perfect Ringing Complete absence of any fire up whatsoever.
- Mild Inaccuracies Slight furrowing of the Conductor's brow -Conductor says "Keep them moving
- Small Trip Frown on face of Conductor. Conductor says " Come along now
- 3. Bigger Trip Conductor begins to glare. Conductor says "Finish it"
- quite loudly. 4. Light crunching involving 2 or more bells - Conductor begins to go red. May shout "PAUL" or some other band member's name
- 5. Heavier crunching involving 3 or more bells One end of change begins to disappear. Conductor begins to stamp foot and shout coursing order. Conductor now crimson.
- 6. Full crunching involving at least half the band First bell on wrong stroke. Conductor now purple with vein standing out on forehead. First obscenity uttered. Light damage to composition.
- 7. Light firing Half the band now striking at once. At least 2 bells on the wrong stroke. Conductor now doing full Morris dancing/village idiot impression. Instructions now incoherent.
- 8. Heavy firing Most of the band now striking together. At least 3 bells on the wrong stroke. Ringing now beyond engineering capabilities of Conductor. Structural damage to composition.
- 9. Storm force firing All but one band member now striking together (called a "Whoomph Ping") At least half the band on the wrong stroke. Terminal damage to composition.
- Heavy storm force firing near total absence of striking. A "wall of ropes". Conductor considers saying "Stand"
- Hurricane force firing Complete absence of striking whatsoever. Conductor says "Stand", grudgingly.





2. Minutes of last meeting (14th April 2015)

4. Election of New Members

Both were elected unanimously and it was good to see that Keith was able to attend the early ringing, service and tea but an evening engagement prevented him from staying for the meeting.

5. Training Events

- Ian reported that the Training event had gone well with raising and lowering taking place in both Dartford and Eltham with a total of 14 students split between the two venues. There were just enough helpers with three at one and two at the other. More would have been beneficial. There is another training event scheduled for 22nd August and although Ian was open to suggestions of what people would like as a subject, he was minded to run another raising and lowering as there were so many applicants for the last session that he could not accommodate them all. Please let him know if you can help out.
- There is an ITTS 1 running at Tunstall on 31st August
- Three is an ITTS 2 running at Staplehurst on 19th September

6. KCACR report on the meeting held on 28th February 2015

- as a result of demand in the Canterbury District, MRFS is looking into sourcing enamel badges at a reduced cost. The General Committee will be kept advised of progress
- it was agreed that Peter Dale would draft a set of guidelines around what would be considered suitable to spend money from the Training fund/budget on from the next meeting

- Caroline Stockmann is stepping down as Independent Auditor so as to not risk any conflict of interest with her new position on the General Committee
- there was now a link to the KCACR Facebook group on the homepage of the KCACR website
- Tim Munt agreed to look into the setup of a membership database, and the possibility of providing membership cards will also be looked into
- a grant request was received from St Peter-in-Thanet, but as the extent of the work required on the bells was not yet known it was agreed to defer any grant offer for the time being
- it was agreed that a Youth Striking Competition would be arranged for the last Saturday in October, hopefully by Ben Legg



- it was agreed that we should approach Ben Legg to ask whether he would be willing to take on the role of "Youth Officer"
- owing to the reduced time the General Committee meetings were now taking, it was agreed future meetings would start at 10.00am instead of 9.30am
