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When I was applying for my first real job, my father gave me some CV-writing advice: "Don't put that you're a bellringer on it; they'll think you're weird." He was right, but not for the reason he thought.
The problem when you have an unusual hobby is that people keep asking questions, so you spend 20 minutes explaining why, no, bellringing is not like the Mars Bar advert with monks leaping up and down to dance music but, yes, there really are people in church towers who choose to ring bells for fun.
I am a first-generation "ringer" and got in to it through the Duke of Edinburgh's Award scheme. I had lessons with the local band; after six months, I was hooked.

Even at that point, in the late 1990s, there was a debate about recruitment
 and retention of new ringers. Now a BBC survey finds delegates to the annual conference of the Central Council of Church Bell Ringers lamenting the difficulties of attracting new members - particularly young new members. It's true. We need new recruits from a range of ages and backgrounds to keep the pastime alive and it's difficult to know how to achieve this. The lure of the internet and the full array of home entertainment options is overwhelming. Why go out to a cold and draughty church on a dark winter's night when you can curl up on the sofa and work your way through a box set?
The answer is for the divine magic of a unique human interaction. You cannot ring church bells alone. There's a sense of camaraderie, of course, like singing in a choir, playing in an orchestra or being on a sports team - you have fun with each other and rely on each other. l've made brilliant friends through ringing.
But there's also a mental and physical challenge involved that is specific to bellringing. You can ring up to 12 bells, as at Southwark Cathedral, and the mathematical permutations of the sequences and the feat of memory and co-ordination needed to produce them can test the most experienced ringer. Though there's a general aim to ring as accurately as possible, there are also some ringers out there determinedly pushing the boundaries of complexity.
It's not for everyone. What I think of as music, others consider noise. One occasionally hears about Londoners moving to beautiful rural villages, only to complain about bells and church clocks chiming. And naturally, we ringers need to realise that our passion is not everyone's cup of tea. But while sound control technologies can be put in towers to muffle the chimes a little, the truth is that the style of bells we have in this country is a peculiarly English joy. Most people become accustomed to it; and in any case, it can be just as big an issue in cities, where high-rise living means that flats might be on a level with the tower louvres.
I now ring bells at two towers every week and teach new ringers of all ages. Most towers with bells in both countryside and cities are looking for recruits. Instruction is usually provided very cheaply or for free, and all that is asked for is a commitment to the time required to learn the motor skills necessary to ring safely. After that you can put in as much or as little as you wish, stick to the basics or make it a lifetime of learning, all the while preserving one of the nation's greatest wonders.

## Exciting News from Sidcup

Sidcup? Yes that's right! We haven't appeared in the newsletter for a long time but finally we're back! For those who have never been here; Sidcup is home to a ring of six, cast in 1843, most recently overhauled with new fittings by Taylors in the 1970s.

Over the past decade, numbers gradually declined here to the point where a practice was almost unsustainable. However the past 12 or so months have seen a huge transformation.
A lot of work had to be done, including a thorough clean of the belfry and ringing room. The belfry hadn't been cleaned in many years, and we filled around seven or eight large bin liners with dust and other muck that had accumulated over time. The belfry also had a huge flying insect problem that had to be rectified before anyone could spend more than a few minutes in the belfry. New ropes were purchased for the back three bells, with PSP tops for ling-life and minimal wear, and a fourth donated by Secretary Yvonne Wright in memory of her late husband, John.

Sidcup now has a weekly practice, semi-regular service ringing and we managed to ring six quarter-peals in 2016. We have regular help from other local ringers, and are teaching a new "home-grown" band from scratch.

This month the tower received its most recent addition. Thanks to incredible generosity from family friends, we were donated an old computer for use with the Abel software, and upon installation of the sensor (not as easy a task as one might think!) we now have a functioning simulator in the tower, which has already proved useful in teaching. As many will know, one of the hardest things about helping someone get some solid practice at learning a method is finding other ringers for them to ring with, but the simulator allows us to teach whenever a learner desires.

We are always happy to see visitors, and we will always do our best to make sure you enjoy your visit, should you decide to come along! We practice on Wednesday evenings (except 2nd Wednesdays) from 8pm (7:30 for learners) and currently ring from 0925 to 1000 on the 1st and 3rd Sunday of the month.

We had our usual Welcoming The New Year ringing although this year this was on the Bank Holiday Monday at noon on 2nd January.

Our normal practice night is Wednesday, 8pm-9.30pm, at Greenwich, but occasionally at St. John's, Deptford or Woolwich if Greenwich is not available.
We usually have good attendances at practice nights, sometimes ringing all 10 bells, some triples, minor and some additional doubles methods and some work on Treble Hunting Minor.


We usually ring for the monthly Choral Evensong at Greenwich and also for Evening Worship at St. John's, Deptford once a month [check the website for dates]. We occasionally ring at Woolwich.

On the evening of Monday $19^{\text {th }}$ December a group from St Paulinus, Crayford had a tower outing to Christchurch, Poplar. Half of us travelled from various stations via Lewisham for the DLR and found the tower a short five minutes walk from Island Gardens station, whilst the other half of our group met at Greenwich and walked through the foot tunnel.

It was on these bells that the first ever peal was rung by band comprising of women only in July 1912. However, the bells were unringable from 1986 when it was discovered the spire was in a dangerous state and the hurricane of October 1987 actually brought part of the spire crashing down. A fund for the restoration of the tower and for other church projects was established, and in 1991 the bells were removed, retuned and rehung.

Forming part of the Docklands Ringing Centre, the teaching which happens here is somewhat different from that which occurs at most towers and is aided by the use of the Abel simulator. There are sensors on all eight bells so any piece of ringing can be recorded and played back afterwards with a graphic display projected onto a screen at the same time. The file can also be imported into the ringing software used by the National 12 Bell Striking Competition and the faults marked.

As this tower lies at the boundary of four ringing districts, a new striking challenge competition was initiated in 2015, open to any regular band within any of these districts, to encourage more ringers to come and try out the software. Crayford had intended to go along in 2015, but we were unable enough people together at such short notice, but a band from Christchurch, Erith did visit that first year.

We didn't go specifically because of the competition, but more for our own curiosity, and it did prove to be a very interesting evening. It won't improve our striking with just that one visit, but being able to see a graphic representation of our ringing and to analyse it objectively afterwards was a real eye-opener. If one ringer is consistently slow at either or both strokes, or maybe someone always leads too quickly, or whether the tenor ringer was often wide, will all be shown on the screen and gives the opportunity to try and correct these faults.

At the time of writing this piece for the newsletter, the results of the 2016 competition have not been announced, although we know we could not have won with either of the two test pieces we produced, although we did manage some respectable scores in the mid 80\%'s. We did take part though and had a very enjoyable and worthwhile evening in the process and we intend to do so again this year. So if your tower is looking for something different to try out this year, why not give it a go?

## 

Report of activities during 2016
Forty-eight Saturday morning practices were held during the year. The four closures were on 18th June for the Dover ringers' outing, 1st October for the Confederation of Cinque Ports Speaker's Day service, Christmas and New Year's Eve. Attendances ranged from nine on 23rd and 30th July to twenty-six on 12th November with an average of about fifteen, one more than last year. The overall total was 711, twelve more than last year's all time high of 699 , but only twenty-one towers were represented which was seven down on last year.

The local mid-week Treble Bob Minor group continued to use the Centre's facilities on occasions. We opened to the public on one of the Heritage Open Days as usual but visitor numbers were down again for the third year running. We welcomed 34 non-ringing visitors to our Saturday practices, 17 from overseas. Facebook group membership has grown by 6 to 33, and a regular following of the old page has been building up steadily.

Practices always begin with exercises to improve bell control, raising and lowering, and addressing handling faults. There was also a demand for teaching new recruits from local towers where no tuition is available. This stretched our resources and we would have prefered to be training new teachers. Two young recruits for Dover were taught to handle the newly-acquired Saxilby dumb bell; one has now transferred on to a tower bell and his younger brother is in the process of doing so.

Methods we use regularly include Ba stow, Cloister, Penultimate, and Ashford Little Bob. There is invariably a demand for Plain Bob Doubles and Grandsire, but more recently for Bob Minor.


## The Future

The same management team has been operating the Centre since it began in 2003. It's only a small team yet for the last twelve years it has run weekly practices on Saturday mornings, open to everyone but intended primarily to offer help at the entry level. Each year it has appointed Peter Dale as Ringing Master, Barbara Dale as Secretary, and David Courtney as Treasurer. On a normal Saturday morning Peter has run the ringing and Barbara has carried out the administration but this is about to change.

From the beginning Barbara has recorded attendances, emptied the collecting box, and organised the refreshment breaks. She would now like someone else to take charge of these tasks and maybe spread them among others. Peter is prepared to continue in post for the
coming year but would like to share the responsibility for running practices. He sees the need to spend more time in helping individuals, particularly those following the Association of Ringing Teachers scheme Learning the Ropes".

Other committee members are Jean Easley, Bob Powell -Williams, and Lindsay Powell-Williams. Steve Popple, and latterly Wendy Rogers, give unstinting support. Apart from Lindsay, who oversees book sales, all of them are willing and able to run the occasional practice by default when necessary. Jean and Peter are the only two teachers qualified to register new learners on the "Learning the Ropes" scheme.

2017 needs to be a year of preparation for a hand-over next January 2018; those of us with an interest in the Centre are looking at options to create a different management structure. Involvement of the Association, or at least the Districts nearest to Dover, would go a long way to saving the Centre from extinction in 2018. The AGM was held on Saturday, 7th January, at St Mary's, Dover, and the outcome will be announced in due course.

## ART. Inowle 2F; F5inllach 2017

This is the Association of Ringing Teachers module 2F course, which provides you with the skills and techniques necessary to build really good foundation ringing skills in your ringers. The course is designed for anyone involved in teaching a new band where the teacher can personally ring at least plain hunt. Theory sessions will cover:

- the importance of approaching teaching in easy, understandable stages,
- the critical importance of using effective feedback,
- the theory of coaching, and
- how to form a strong band.

This theory is supported by practical sessions that show how to develop these skills, including how to teach call changes, an exploration of kaleidoscope ringing, and different ways to introduce ringers to covering and plain hunt.
The course is yet to have a venue, but is going to be held in the Canterbury District somewhere. Booking is now available on the ART website, but please let me know too by emailing training@kcacr.org.uk so that I can keep track of numbers.

I am new to the training officer role and really need to know what other training courses the county think they would benefit from. If there's anything that you think would help you and your band, please let me know by emailing training@kcacr.org.uk and I can sort something out.

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St George's church in Ypres was designed by Sir Reginald Blomfield, designer of the Menin Gate. It was built to serve the British community that settled in Ypres after the First World War and is a focal point for any pilgrimage to Ypres. Chairs, windows, wall plaques and kneelers all commemorate individual soldiers, regiments, battalions, school old boys, and others. It's a place of poignancy, of countless stories.

The impressive church tower of solid construction may have been intended to house a ring of bells but that didn't happen at the time. Now, during these WW1 centenary years, a group of bell-ringers is aiming to have a peal of eight bells installed there. They will be the first bells hung for English change-ringing in Belgium and will honour the men who lie in the surrounding fields, in marked or unmarked graves. The aim is to raise $£ 195,000$ to cast and install the bells, improve the acoustics within and outside the tower, and fit a cctv system so that the bells and ringers may be seen in the church.

Anglican services are held at St George's every Sunday and the bells will be a sound of home for pilgrims and visitors to the cemeteries. The fund-raising group is a Registered Charity, spearheaded by London ringer Alan Regin. His interest was triggered by the bell ringers' Roll of Honour kept in a display cabinet in the north tower of St Paul's Cathedral. It contained 1,076 names and when Alan asked what was known about the men the answer was "It's just a list of names, isn't it?"
Not any more. Over the past 25 years, Alan has spent thousands of hours visiting war cemeteries in search of the graves of young soldiers who were bell ringers and his research has uncovered over 200 more names. He has recorded well over a thousand stories, their occupations, their parents, home towns and villages, and the day each died. He is always reminding bell-ringers in Britain to honour individuals on the centenary of their deaths by ringing bells at churches where the men themselves rang.

For instance St Mary's Parish Church in Dover lost four ringers in the conflict and to date the Dover

ringers have rung quarter peals for three of them. In August 2014 they remembered Percy Gibbs and this year they rang two quarters, in April for George Saunders and in May for Arthur Roberts. Walter Corteen was the fourth member of the Dover band so no doubt they'll be hearing again from Alan as his centenary approaches in 2018. Various quarters have already been rung in the Lewisham District. The next one at Crayford will be on 9th February and will remember Gunner William Thomas Audsley, the brother of Herbert (Bert) Audsley who appears on many peal boards around the district.

Alan Regin talks movingly on this subject and the project "Bells4StGeorge" is his most significant act of commemoration yet in that it embraces all soldiers who perished irrespective of whether they were bell ringers or not. The project's own website www.bells4stgeorge.org has the history of the Memorial Church with some details of the project but there's a more detailed account at https://mydonate.bt.com/ charities/bells4stgeorgeypres. The Whitechapel Bell Foundry, the world's most famous bell foundry and Britain's oldest manufacturing company (founded 1570), is due to close in May 2017. The building has been sold but negotiations for the future ownership of the business are underway.
"We have made this decision with a heavy heart, but in response to the changing realities of running a business of this kind. The Bell Foundry in Whitechapel has changed hands many times, but it has always been a family business. My own family has owned the foundry since 1904, but other families have run the firm through its history, which stretches back to 1570. The business has been at its present site over two hundred and fifty years. So it is probably about time it moved once again. We hope that this move will provide an opportunity for the business to move forward in a new direction." Alan \& Kathryn Hughes

## 8. KCACR report on the meeting held on 27th August 2016

- The accounts for 2013, 2014 and 2015 have now been audited and a compliance certificate issued.
- On recommendation from the auditor, it was agreed that we will try once more to find the missing Sage Accounts software, and then re-purchase if required.
- The grant award for Eastling has been cancelled following a note from the incumbent there.
- The new KCACR website went live recently, and soon content owners will be able to edit/add their own content to the site.
- A schedule for the creation of the 2017 handbook has been created by the Handbook Editor.
- Catherine Lewis has agreed to look into arranging a Module 2F ART course in the county if sufficient interest exists.
- The Secretary is going to write to the incumbent at Strood to ask if their project to install a ring of bells is still going ahead.
- A proposed rule change to be considered at the 2017 AGM will be circulated to Districts ready for their ADMs in October.
- A final request for volunteers to help with the KCA Mobile Ring will be made by the Secretary, along with a member survey to ascertain if there really is a need/want for this as is already thought - deadline 31 st December 2016 to make a decision.
- The County 6-bell Striking Competition 2016 will be held on Saturday 24th September, 9.45am draw, in the Lewisham District at Farnborough.
- It was agreed that the Kent Young Ringers band could enter the County 6-bell competition effectively as a 'scratch' band, for competition practice.
- The County Youth Striking Competition 2016 will be held on Saturday 22nd October at Otford.
- The Association are entering a band in the Essex Trophy being held at Writtle, Essex on Saturday 10th September.
- The final General Committee meeting in 2016 is on 26 th November.

Dr Phil Barnes spoke about a proposed rule change which related to the aims of the Association, to focus more on Ringing and Ringers.
The current aims have remained unchanged since 1880 and list five aims:-
I. The establishment, maintenance and encouragement of service ringing in the churches in its area.
II. The recognition of ringers as church workers
III. The proper care and use of bells and belfries
IV. The cultivation of the art of change ringing
V. The safety and wellbeing of its Members

It is proposed to amend the aims of the KCACR to one overarching aim which reads:-

## 'The aim of the Association is to foster ringing in the historic county of Kent by promoting and protecting the

 interests of ringing and ringers'.A discussion ensued around whether the church aspect of ringing puts some people off, some felt that their main reason for ringing was to glorify God. Others were concerned that the word 'bell' had been removed so the type of ringing could be ambiguous.
A full transcript regarding the proposed rule change to be circulated around the district and be an agenda item for the January meeting to give people more time to think about it before it is voted on at the AGM on Easter Monday at Cranbrook. ACTION - Secretary to circulate.

## 9. Past Events and Upcoming Events

- Lewisham District won the County six bell competition at Farnborough on $24^{\text {th }}$ September.
- The joint outing with Tonbridge District to London on $6^{\text {th }}$ August was very successful and very well attended. The date for next year has already been set, $12^{\text {th }}$ August and will be organised by Tonbridge.
