### **Wow – from the District call change competition to the National 12 Bel**

In 2019 one time Eynsford boy Matthew Hilling held aloft the National 12 Bell Competition trophy at Exeter Cathedral to rapturous applause from a packed nave of maybe a thousand folks. The Cathedral band led by Matthew had triumphed beating Birmingham, the College Youths, St Paul's Cathedral and others in the Stedman Cinques test piece. The Dean who presented the Trophy was clearly delighted with the result! Matthew's response was - "wow" followed by many emotional thankyous. The Exeter triumph came on top of their splendid hosting providing very much a win - win day.

Earlier proceedings had commenced with a welcome by The Bishop and The Dean and the loan of the Bishop's mitre for the draw! More than a hundred busy volunteers ensured that the days arrangements ran smoothly. Listening and socialising was from the south cloister garden with the adjacent Chapter House facilities and also from the colourful and extensive Bishop's Palace garden with marquees for refreshments and toddlers' play. Some warm summer weather arrived on cue - and all twenty-four beer barrels were drunk dry!

The proceedings were broadcast on YouTube for eight hours by an accomplished presenter and shown on large screens in the Chapter House and the Cathedral nave. The YouTube broadcast can be found with a search "Exeter 12 bell competition". Test pieces were relayed via a camera above the bells and Exeter's piece is at 2h 39m with the results at 7h 50m.



In 1989 12 year old Matthew was holding another trophy as a District call change winner with the Eynsford and Farningham band. It was Matthew's first competition having learned at Eynsford earlier that year. In the December he rang his first peal, at Eynsford.

Ringing and further learning at Kent towers followed and included cycle outings when the roads then were less hazardous. Election to CY membership was shortly after his 14th birthday and he began to develop his twelve bell skills.

At Exeter University Matthew joined the Exeter Colleges Guild and was Master for two years. After graduation he decided his life would be in Devon and ended up back at Uni working in an I.T. role. He became Tower Captain at St Mark's, a position he held for 15 years during which time he managed the augmentation there to ten bells.

For many years, ringer development has been on Matthew's agenda with tutoring at Hereford (alongside many from our District), Keele and at Central Council courses. He was Exeter Branch Ringing Master for ten years helping others to advance.

For the past thirteen years Matthew has been Ringing Master at Exeter Cathedral where a high standard is achieved and where many members are

comfortable in advanced Surprise Maximus methods. He has led the Exeter Cathedral band in 12 bell competition finals where their highest position was fourth, and in the Devon 8 bell call change competition which the band has won.

Matthew has rung Exeter Cathedral tenor (72 cwt) single handed to Maximus three times. Elsewhere he conducted the record peals of Cambridge S Maximus (2015) and the 25,000 Bristol S Maximus (2017).


### Chairman's Bit

### REMEMBERING EDITH CAVEL

You might be interested in a peal I was invited to ring in at St Mary's, Dover yesterday, 14th May. It was to mark the centenary of the return of the body of Edith Cavell, WW1 nurse and heroine executed by German firing squad in Brussels in 1915.

After the war, in 1919, her body was brought by ship to Dover, then taken to Westminster Abbey for a commemoration service and then to Norwich where she was buried in the precincts of the cathedral. As her body arrived in Dover on 14th May 1919 a full peal was rung on the bells and a peal board in the ringing chamber, shown below, records that fact.

The details of the latest peal are as follows:

Rung with the bells half muffled except the tenor to mark the centenary of the body of Nurse Edith Cavell being received in Dover, a similar peal using the same method and composition having been rung on 14th May 1919.

There was extensive coverage by the press in Kent and when the peal 'came round' after 2hrs

ringing | 52mins there was applause from those listening in the church.

The memorial to Edith Cavell is in London. situated close to St Martin in the Fields and Trafalgar Square.

### What is ART all about?

Saturday morning, 22 June, I arrived at Higham and parked by a Victorian looking building with a bell tower and spire... St John's Church. I am a bit early but decide to go in anyway to check that I am at the right place. I'm booked for ART (Association of Ringing Teachers) course here today.

The church seems empty but I find a room with some other trainees, refreshments and someone who serves these refreshments. 'It was worth coming here' I thought sipping my tea, munching biscuits and feeling very welcomed.



When everybody had arrived we went through registration and plans for the day and then our fun began! I understand that we all have been taught how to ring so we all obviously have some ideas of how to teach. But...

There are so many teachers who have different approaches and techniques which you don't know about because you have only been taught by one or two of them. I feel like this course collects and combines all the known options, experiences, advices, ways and structures of teaching in one module. It seems like a lot to take in. Despite that you don't have to make piles of notes as everything is covered and supported by provided guides and logbooks, which are in a very well containing organized manner all the considerations you should go through with your learner, building skills exercises, practical and theory targets.

Some of us know all the theory, can easily explain the physics of a moving bell and yet feel anxious to grab a rope to rescue a learner. If that's you, I encourage you to try this course. Some of us are more than happy to assist physically with back/hand strokes, taking rope

from a learner but not good at the talking part. And again... If that's you - try this course.

We had a few sessions of theory and a few practice sessions (and lunch!). We were teachers, we were learners, working on hand and back strokes, ringing up and down, rescuing each other and spotting bad handling. An interesting exercise was to ring left handed. It makes you think and adds a bit of a twist to your ability to control the bell.

Also what really stood out for me is how many psychological aspects are involved in teaching handling. The way you were taught to ring won't necessarily work for your learner, because we are all unique. We all understand, memorise and learn things differently. For some verbal instruction is enough, others would like to see a demonstration and some have to experience physically what it's going to be like. So if you want to be a good teacher you'll have to patiently and tactfully adapt to your trainee's needs for him/her to succeed in their learning journey.

We covered some safeguarding issues as potentially we will have to work with children and vulnerable adults. Every learner should be deeply respected and valued.

I think this is it from me. Now all I have to do is to find a learner, a volunteer, a victim! Any takers? I'll see you in St John's Church, Sidcup, Wednesdays at 8 pm.

Endless thanks to Roger Booth for teaching us to teach, to David Grimwood for being that someone who serves the refreshments and to Higham ringers for hosting the course and letting us into your tower.

All of the above were elected unanimously and welcomed to the Association with special mention being given to Maria and Lynn who were at the meeting.

### 5. KCACR Report.

Natalie Slator outlined the main points of the last committee meeting.

- A central membership database is under consideration to ensure compliance with GDPR. This would involve
  having a central membership secretary and subscriptions paid directly to KCACR. Members would be able to
  log in to pay subs and check their details.
- Publicity to emphasise the benefits of membership.
- Bookstalls. Districts would maintain some basic stock but it was envisaged that purchases of books be made online via the County website, as is now the case for clothing.
- Consideration needs to be given for aiding ringers with dementia. Each case must be considered individually.
- Safeguarding. Details of Diocesan training are on the website. (Further discussion at Item 6 below).
- Monitoring of the Junior Facebook page.
- Mobile ring Cost £30K approx. Aiming for 2020 the committee voted to go with Matthew Higby and will seek acceptance of that at the AGM.
- Accounts not yet signed off. A central policy on expenses was needed.
- Training. Further ART events planned. Further Safeguarding training planned.
- CCCBR meeting in London, September 2019. (Further discussion at Item 7 below).
- KCACR AGM. Nominations needed for Treasurer and Safeguarding officer.
- A grant was made to support Young Ringers.

### Association Library and Archive:

The County Librarian requests support. There is a need for a person with appropriate skills to ensure that ringing records in the county are maintained and developed. Anyone interested to make themselves known to a District Officer.

### County AGM 2020:

This will be held in the Lewisham District on Easter Monday, April 13<sup>th</sup> 2020. Philippa reported that the District Committee has commenced planning. Bickley have been approached as first choice for the venue, but they are still working out whether it's possible for them to host. Back-up venues are also being considered.

### 6. Safeguarding.

The KCACR is strongly recommending that all ringers undertake C0 and C1 online training (accessed via Diocesan websites), but ringers must also check with their Parish church as they may require further training to be taken. Tower Captains and those directly involved in teaching must complete a C2 course. The Chairman emphasised that each local church took the lead on how safeguarding was managed on its premises, and the KCACR guidance was supporting that, not replacing it. If a church required its ringers to do more, that had to be respected, but if this would cause major problems for anyone the County Safeguarding Officer could be consulted for advice.

It was suggested that ringers can work in groups to take the course, particularly those who may be unfamiliar with working online or who do not have easy access to the internet. It was important to appreciate that safeguarding covers both children and vulnerable adults.

A question was asked regarding the minimum age to start ringing. Towers had different rules, based on age, height and ability to learn. Consideration must also be given to insurance cover; the local church insurance cover may have an age limit specified. Cathy Cheeseman reported that the Association was considering changing its insurers. Incidents may also be covered by an individual church insurance. It was agreed that further clarification was needed.

### 7. Central Council AGM – September 2019.

This will take place at Goldsmiths College, New Cross on Saturday  $7^{th}$  September. Related events and a mini 'Ringing Roadshow' will take place over  $6^{th} - 8^{th}$  September. We have been asked to help by supplying volunteers to ensure events run smoothly (cf Gamesmakers at the 2012 Olympics!). In particular, they are looking for one person from the District or area to lead and coordinate this – volunteers please!

### 8. Tower Reps Proposal.

The Chairman outlined the scheme, the details of reps/towers is in the April Newsletter. The District Committee (ie the elected officers) are now meeting on a regular basis outside of District Quarterly Meetings. Although these meetings have been triggered by the planning of the next County AGM in our District, in 2020, they will continue after that as they are useful. One of the things agreed is a trial 'Tower Reps' scheme, where each member of the committee has three or four towers in the District that they are officially the rep for at meetings. The idea is they would visit these towers on a practice night (if they have one) every couple of months, and communicate information about business that has arisen since the last District Quarterly meeting. The ringers at the tower can also ask them to let the committee know anything they would like to flag up or ask about, for example help in training new learners, or issues with their church. Many other Districts have this system already. The list of towers and their reps is shown below:
